Communication with Parents: How a phone call to families can make a difference!



A simple thing like reaching out to parents and connecting with them in this challenging time provides an opportunity to forge lasting relationships. It doesn't require any complex training - just a good heart and willingness to listen. A phone call home really makes a difference! Below are tips for overcoming obstacles to connect with families and parents:

- Introduce yourself by your first name, it helps to ease tension
- Begin the conversation with a positive
- · Describe only actions- avoid labeling
- Ask questions to seek what ways they need support
- Call with good news to build trust, rapport and as a great morale booster
- Send texts and emails to keep in communication, weekly updates can go a long way with families
- Take one step at a time, make the first calls home and continue to build a relationship with family members to support their child throughout the school year

Communication Tools

Communication tools are an amazing way to help the community organizations, schools and teachers connect with students and their families. There have been new applications (Apps) and resources that have helped to keep students connected to their classroom, teachers and lessons. This has helped families continue to learn while we transition to staying at home to protect our loved ones. In Hawai'i, teachers have been using Google Classroom, ClassDojo, as well as the school's websites. Some schools now provide a counselor corner where students can connect with their school's counselor and find resources and support online! Did you know, there are applications that do not require internet connection for text messages with important updates and information to alert families? Possip is one example, that does not require internet connection, to send text messages to cell phones to alert families of updates and information. PCNCs on Big Island have been using the app to connect with families. Download Purposity and follow Hawai'i Public Schools.

Locally, the Education for Homeless Children and Youth (EHCY) have been making strides in their efforts to support communities in need. They are reaching out to families to find out what they need and have partnered with local community organizations to get supplies out through drivers and liaisons across the state. They have been actively using the Purposity app which has been great at helping community members support those in need. Now featured on The Today Show, this app works to connect communities so neighbors can see the needs and help fill them.



Six Process Conditions Working with Cohort 1 (Kaua'i)

The Hawai'i Family Engagement Center had the pleasure of partnering with Kauai Community College and 6 public schools in the Kaua'i District. Scholastic's Family and Community Engagement team facilitated three full-day training sessions on the best practices and strategies for family engagement a school-wide approach. Each school created an action team which consists of five foundational members: an administrator, teacher, parent, and two additional representatives.



Additional members included either a member from the community, school staff, or parent. The training series focused on Dr. Karen Mapp's dual capacity-building framework. At the end of the training sessions, each school team collaborated to re-create and re-tool a school event applying the family engagement strategies. In order for an event to truly encompass the full range of family engagement, it must include the 6 Process Conditions:

1	Relational: Built on mutual trust	2	Linked to learning and development	3	Asset-based: Recognize community strengths
_	Culturally responsive and respectful	3	Collaborative	O	Interactive

Each action team used school data to prioritize areas where they would like to enhance students' learning. They re-designed their school events with these focuses in mind ensuring new skills and knowledge are transferred to all members of the family.

Waimea HS, Kapa'a HS and Kapa'a Middle successfully re-tooled a school event immediately following the training. The other participating schools plan to implement their re-tooled events in the near future.



Strategies and tips that the participants shared included:

- Empowering families to support student comprehension of science related text with a science and technology family event
- Helping families understand how to have vocabulary rich conversations with their children through a literacy night
- Recommending ways for parents to create a focused environment and time to support their child's reading practice
- Empowering families to support students with literacy comprehension using non-fiction articles

Overall takeaways about successful family engagement that participants shared:

- The buy-in from teachers and all school faculty is very important to the partnership to improve student success
- Establish communication with families; parents and teachers often share similar concerns
- Family engagement is a **partnership** and it is a **solution**

Following the success of the training sessions, we are continuing to support the Kaua'i cohort through monthly webinars and technical assistance. Stay tuned for more information on our upcoming Cohort in Hawai'i county!




'Ohana Tips for Parents: Ways to Support At-Home Learning
