Ho'oku'i Expands Support to First Year University Students at UHM...

When Ho'oku'i Projects (I, II, III, IV) began, financial and mentoring support ended when students graduated from High School. A *NEW* opportunity exists through Ho'oku'i V for students who are entering their first year at UHM and who are selected by a committee to receive one of the ten available competitive Ho'oku'i V scholarships. First preference will go to students who are Native Hawaiian, and have been active in Ho'oku'i III, IV, or V, and participated in Mānoa Academy or completed their Associates degree prior to finishing high school. All details to successfully apply for this competitive scholarship, which covers first-year tuition, required student fees, and books (about \$12,000) are on our Ho'oku'i V: Kūlia i ka Nu'u website. Most importantly, the scholarship includes a dedicated mentor, Native Hawaiian Project Liaison, Aunty Misty Kela'i, who will provide support to the students throughout the year with Native Hawaiian Student Services, our project partner, located at the Queen Lili'uokalani Student Services Building on the upper campus of UHM.


